


In 2019, Information Services

Common Information Services Requests



Most people reach out to learn about our programs and services, but those who are newly diagnosed may have a list of questions about epilepsy and seizures.

Parents ask how to make their child's school a safer place in the event they have a seizure. Adults with epilepsy want to learn about medication side effects, alternative treatment options, or seizure detection and treatment devices from our Information Services staff. Our staff includes Regional Coordinators and the Information Services Senior Coordinator, Debbie Leone.
